We intend to re-open a side door which has been sealed for many years, as a disabled access. This will necessitate a ramp for wheelchairs. This access is required by law which is due to be brought in this October.

We were recently offered the old organ from the Royal National Hospital chapel. This is currently at St. Mark's Church in Wootton. With the pipes soaring to 15ft. we, unfortunately, could not give

The family connection with Bonchurch continued down the years, many of us can remember yet another Dan who ran the Bonchurch taxi service.

From the Archives is for Daniel Day and family

Daniel Day was born in Whitwell in 1814. His father, Stephen, was a stone-mason who was later employed in building Steephill Castle and 'Cove Cottage' in Belgrave Road in 1828. In 1832 he was killed in an accident at the Castle, when he was struck by a block of stone falling from the building.

Daniel also became a stonemason and continued the family business in Ventnor at the time the town started to grow and built many of the early houses.

About 1840 he partnered Jonathan Jolliffe in building the many fine villas which sprang up in Bonchurch after the building ban was lifted by Act of Parliament in 1838. They also built the 'new' church in 1849. Properties from this era in Bonchurch today are a lasting testament to Mr. Day's workmanship. He built 'Elm Cottage' in the main village street. It was to become the family home for various members of the Day family for about 150 years. It was re-named 'The Croft' and it still bears that name today. Daniel later lived at 'Wykeham Cottage,' Upper Bonchurch. Three of his children lived 'The Retreat' at the top of Bonchurch Shute.

In 1894 the firm of Daniel Day and Son, now run by his sons, another Daniel, and Alfred, is recorded as 'having an extensive business including a spacious timber yard and workshop for the cutting of wood, stone and marble. They were builders of reputation, undertakers (with their own monumental masons), ran an estate agency, grew vegetables, flowers and fruit in their own market garden at Upper Bonchurch. Daniel was a Bonchurch parish overseer and councillor and a collector of taxes! If all that were not enough, they were insurance agents for the Royal Insurance.

We thoroughly enjoyed lunches at the Beach Hut Diner and at the Woodman's Arms, following the trip to Havenstreet Railway, all arranged by Brenda.

Over the last six months, many research queries have been answered for people calling into the Museum, and by post. Fay has found information from our archives and from her own research files at home for some 30 enquirers, as far away as New Zealand and Canada. People have wanted to know about subjects including the Gasworks, St. Lawrence Hall, Ventnor Sailing Club, The Heights, Enfield House, the Royal Marine and families - Trueman, Compton, Banbury, Gilbert, Turner and Bucknall. It all takes time - and patience but she enjoys it and around £300 has been received in donations of thanks.

This is the inside of the complimentary ticket issued to Miss Newnham of The Dairy, Dudley Road, when this picture-house was first opened in 1924. (Later re-named "The Gaiety"). The ticket was given to the Museum by Fred Farrow.



NEWS FROM THE TRUSTEES

Mr. Rex Lancefield, our regular conservator, does not specialise in the necessary work which was needed to restore our model of two 'cottages' which shows how the Royal National Hospital actually began. Wealthy benefactors donated the cost of each block of 'cottages' which eventually made up the quarter of a mile long hospital. Many sources were contacted before we attracted the attention of Corinne Hillman of Camberwell College of Art. Corinne came to meet us and was most impressed with the exceptionally detailed model. At present one of her students is restoring it (as her project) and we hope it will be finished by the middle of the year.

In Autumn 2003 the Trustees recommended that we sent some delicate and delapidated items for conservation, some of which were deteriorating with handling. The Executive Committee agreed that around £1200 could be spent. The work has been completed satisfactorily and returned to us.

Each meeting we are surprised with the number, and variety, of items which appear - photos, postcards, legal documents, Carnival programmes, hotel brochures - and ... a Ventnor Laundry box lid and a piece of stone from the now demolished Beauchamp House.

Items not applicable to our area have been given to the County Record Office, and Sandown, Shanklin and East Cowes History Societies.
